Time is moving fast and it is hard to believe that the next Australian Match Rifle & Long Range Championships are only now 10 months away (15-19 July 2020, Raglan QLD). The program is available in the Calendar section of the Match Rifle website. As usual the Championships include the State Teams competitions and all State Associations have been contacted and asked to provide Match Rifle, F Open and FTR Teams. I want to encourage everyone to apply for their State Team. Don't leave it to others – we need all States to enter teams to continue to build a strong competition. Win or lose it is always a great experience to represent your State so give it a go! If you haven't heard about nominations for your State team please make enquiries with your State Association.

Please note that there is provision within the rules for States to combine if they are unable to field a team on their own provided NRAA approval is given for this. If your State has insufficient numbers for a full team, contact the AMRA Secretary, Philip Bain, or myself to discuss this option.

The shooting program for the year is now in its final stages with only 2 more events for the year. The Ultra Long Range Challenge in early October in Coonabarabran, NSW is 2 ½ days of competition including a number of opportunities to shoot at 1500 yards. The final event is the Victorian Championships on 2 & 3 November at Stawell. This is always a great weekend to end the shooting year.

Woomera 2019

One minute we are having the first practice and then suddenly we are all at Bisley. Most of the team has been here before, but for some this is the first time at this great range. The historic buildings and for long range shooters, the 1200 yard range – Stickledown – with 50 targets, is one of the best shooting environments in the world.

Practices concentrated on refining ammunition and getting consistent group sizes with a specific set of parameters in mind. Did we get there? Read on......

The visit to the UK began with most of the Team gathering at Bisley to collect the ammunition and non-dangerous goods (jackets, mats, rests etc) which were shipped separately. Many of the Team then travelled north to Scotland, shooting at Blair Atholl in the Scottish mountains. We were made most welcome by the Scots and this was a chance for us to get over jet-lag and make sure we had remembered to pack everything!



And so to Bisley. The weather leading up to the visit was a typical British summer with lots of rain, but we were lucky; the sun arrived and stayed throughout the match rifle shooting competitions.

We had a warm-up Team match against Ireland and Scotland in the Heritage Trophy & Lex Lyons match, which is a commendably laid-back affair and then it was time for the Hopton. This is the GB national MR competition and there were over 120 MR shooters competing. Shooting 'Bisley-style', two to a target, stretches the wind-reading skills and in addition there is the difference between target positions on the range to cope with. You think you have got a bit of an idea and then the wind comes from the other direction the next day and it's back to the drawing board.

The Hopton finishes with the 'Albert'. This is three distances and no sighters. Always a difficult day and Phil Bain managed the best score of the Australian Team, although sadly this could not make up for his trigger problem earlier in the competition. Overall it was clear the Aussie Team had found shooting on the other side of the world to be a bit more of a challenge than some anticipated and we would have to work hard to get back to form for the Woomera.

The next day is 'Elcho' day. A match between the Home Countries which has been shot for over 100 years, but also includes the Overseas Match Rifle Teams event (trophy donated by Martin Townsend) when the

Australian Team is in Bisley. The Overseas Teams is shot concurrent to the Elcho and consists of 8 shooters on two targets over three distances: 1000, 1100 and 1200 yards with the top 4 scores at each range counted. The first range at 1000 yards proved close with Scotland, England, Australia and Wales only separated by 3 points going back to 1100 yards. Australia put in a strong 1100 yards picking up 4 points on Scotland and 7 points on Wales to be in second place only 1 point behind England at the end of 1100 yards. At 1200 yards England only dropped 8 points and took the Overseas Match by 7 points from Scotland with Australia third a further 5 points adrift.

So with some heart we prepared for the Woomera. Pitted against a strong GB Team we were always going to have to work hard and despite sterling efforts by the shooters and coaches – not helped by a scope problem - GB won by a healthy margin (again). GB 1758.208 v Aus 1702.143.

The next Woomera match will be in Australia in 2022. Venue to be confirmed.





Scotland 2019

Members of the Australian MR Team were privileged to be invited by the National Rifle Club of Scotland to shoot at the iconic Blair Atholl range in the Scottish highlands prior to this year's Woomera competition.

Unfortunately competing time demands of work etc meant that only a small contingent of shooters and supporters could make the trip north. Those that did were warmly welcomed and treated to a wonderful weekend of shooting at "Blair".

Saturday was a day of individual competition with the weather proving 'brisk'. Newcomers to Blair were briefed on it's eccentricities like needing to adjust for elevation at the same time as making any wind adjustments due to the infamous 'tilt' of the range and the winds coming up and down the glen. MR Shooting at Blair is done at the unique distances of 987 yds, 1114 yds and 1233 yds which required some intelligence gathering to calculate how much to come up between ranges.

27 shooters took part in the individual competition on Saturday with the day won by Scotland's Mike Barlow with 217.18. Highest placed Australian was Philip Bain on 205.12. The day was capped off with a formal dinner at the historic Atholl Arms Hotel courtesy of our Scottish hosts.

Sunday was team competition day with the Australian contingent up against a strong Scotland team competing for

the Captains'
Quaich. The
Captains Quaich was

donated by the current and four previous Captains of Scotland and the plinth has been inscribed with the scores of the last three matches between the countries from 2001, 2006 and 2012.

With a true Highland wind blowing, the Scotland team and coaches had come prepared with knee rugs, gloves and warm hats. The Australians thought it was supposed to be summer!

Teams were 8 shooters with coaches and each team having two targets. Shooting was on electronic targets which provided some learnings for the Australians for future events. Placement of the screens so that coaches can see what was happening on both targets is important particularly as the Aussies didn't have communication headsets.

Scotland's final score of 1718.177 was comfortably ahead of Australia with 1643.111.



Matt Lagana (FTR) in his second attempt at this competition managed the win over Mick Punti in the Grand Aggregate - an event Mick had won 3 out of the previous 4 years.

Stuart Braund, also in his second time in the SA Championships, took the honours in F Open by a narrow 6 points over the 6 range competition in at times blustery conditions.

Match Rifle proved to be an 'up and down' affair with the lead changing throughout Day 2. Ultimately Peter Maher with a strong final 1200 yards, took the Grand Aggregate by 5 points from Shane Courtney the overnight leader – who had shot a 100@1200 for the 20 shot match on Day 1.
